Reading for Sunday, April 26th, 2020

Reading 1, Acts 2:14, 22-28

- ¹⁴ Then Peter stood up with the Eleven and addressed them in a loud voice: 'Men of Judaea, and all you who live in Jerusalem, make no mistake about this, but listen carefully to what I say.
- ²² 'Men of Israel, listen to what I am going to say: <u>Jesus</u> the <u>Nazarene</u> was a <u>man</u> commended to you by <u>God</u> by the miracles and portents and signs that <u>God</u> worked through him when he was among you, as you know.
- ²³ This man, who was put into your power by the deliberate <u>intention</u> and foreknowledge of God, you took and had crucified and killed by men outside the Law.
- ²⁴ But <u>God</u> raised him to life, freeing him from the pangs of Hades; for it was impossible for him to be held in its power since,
- ²⁵ as David says of him: I kept the <u>Lord</u> before my sight always, for with him at my <u>right</u> hand nothing can shake me.
- ²⁶ So my heart rejoiced my tongue delighted; my body, too, will rest secure,
- ²⁷ for you <u>will</u> not abandon me to Hades or allow your holy one to see corruption.
- ²⁸ You have taught me the way of life, you will fill me with joy in your presence.

Responsorial Psalm, Psalms 16:1-2, 5, 7-8, 9-10, 11

- ¹ [In a quiet voice Of David] Protect me, O God, in you is my refuge.
- ² To <u>Yahweh</u> I say, 'You are my Lord, my <u>happiness</u> is in none
- ⁵ My birthright, my cup is Yahweh; you, you alone, hold my lot secure.
- ⁷ I bless <u>Yahweh</u> who is my counsellor, even at night my heart instructs me.
- ⁸ I keep <u>Yahweh</u> before me always, for with him at my <u>right</u> hand, nothing can shake me.
- ⁹ So my heart rejoices, my soul delights, my body too will rest secure,
- ¹⁰ for you will not abandon me to Sheol, you cannot allow your faithful servant to see the abyss.
- ¹¹ You <u>will</u> teach me the path of life, unbounded joy in your presence, at your <u>right</u> hand delight for ever.

Reading 2, First Peter 1:17-21

- ¹⁷ And if you address as Father him who <u>judges</u> without favouritism according to each individual's deeds, live out the <u>time</u> of your exile here in reverent awe.
- ¹⁸ For you know that the price of your ransom from the futile way of <u>life</u> handed down from your ancestors was paid, not in anything perishable like silver or gold,

- ¹⁹ but in precious blood as of a blameless and spotless lamb, Christ.
- ²⁰ He was marked out before the world was made, and was revealed at the final point of time for your sake.
- ²¹ Through him you now have <u>faith</u> in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him <u>glory</u> for this very purpose -- that your <u>faith</u> and <u>hope</u> should be in God.

Gospel, *Luke 24:13-35*

- ¹³ Now that very same day, two of them were on their way to a village called Emmaus, seven miles from Jerusalem,
- ¹⁴ and they were talking together about all that had happened.
- ¹⁵ And it happened that as they were talking together and discussing it, <u>Jesus</u> himself came up and walked by their side;
- ¹⁶ but their eyes were prevented from recognising him.
- ¹⁷ He said to them, 'What are all these things that you are discussing as you walk along?' They stopped, their faces downcast.
- ¹⁸ Then one of them, called Cleopas, answered him, 'You must be the only <u>person</u> staying in <u>Jerusalem</u> who does not know the things that have been happening there these last few days.'

- ¹⁹ He asked, 'What things?' They answered, 'All about <u>Jesus</u> of Nazareth, who showed himself a <u>prophet</u> powerful in action and speech before <u>God</u> and the whole people;
- ²⁰ and how our chief priests and our leaders handed him over to be sentenced to death, and had him crucified.
- ²¹ Our own <u>hope</u> had been that he would be the one to set Israel free. And this is not all: two whole days have now gone by since it all happened;
- ²² and some women from our group have astounded us: they went to the <u>tomb</u> in the early morning,
- ²³ and when they could not find the body, they came back to tell us they had seen a vision of angels who declared he was alive.
- ²⁴ Some of our friends went to the <u>tomb</u> and found everything exactly as the women had reported, but of him they saw nothing.'
- ²⁵ Then he said to them, 'You foolish men! So slow to believe all that the prophets have said!
- ²⁶ Was it not necessary that the <u>Christ</u> should suffer before entering into his glory?'
- ²⁷ Then, starting with <u>Moses</u> and going through all the prophets, he explained to them the passages throughout the scriptures that were about himself.
- ²⁸ When they drew near to the village to which they were going, he made as if to go on;

- ²⁹ but they pressed him to stay with them saying, 'It is nearly evening, and the day is almost over.' So he went in to stay with them.
- ³⁰ Now while he was with them at table, he took the bread and said the blessing; then he broke it and handed it to them.
- ³¹ And their eyes were opened and they recognised him; but he had vanished from their sight.
- ³² Then they said to each other, 'Did not our hearts burn within us as he talked to us on the road and explained the scriptures to us?'
- ³³ They set out that instant and returned to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven assembled together with their companions,
- 34 who said to them, 'The Lord has indeed risen and has appeared to Simon.'
- ³⁵ Then they told their story of what had happened on the road and how they had recognised him at the breaking of bread.
