Reading for 24th Sunday of Ordinary time - A

Reading 1, Sirach 27:30-28:7

³⁰ Resentment and anger, these are foul things too, and a sinner is a master at them both. ¹ Whoever exacts vengeance will experience the vengeance of the Lord, who keeps strict account of sin. ² Pardon your neighbour any wrongs done to you, and when you pray, your sins will be forgiven. ³ If anyone nurses <u>anger</u> against another, can one then demand compassion from the Lord? ⁴ Showing no pity for someone like oneself, can one then plead for one's own sins? ⁵ Mere creature of flesh, yet cherishing resentment!-who will forgive one for sinning? ⁶ Remember the last things, and stop hating, corruption and death, and be faithful to the commandments. ⁷ Remember the covenant of the Most High, and ignore the offence.

Responsorial Psalm, Psalms 103:1-2, 3-4, 9-10, 11-12

¹ [Of David] Bless Yahweh, my soul, from the depths of my being, his holy name; ² bless Yahweh, my soul, never forget all his <u>acts</u> of kindness.

³ He forgives all your offences, cures all your diseases, ⁴ he redeems your <u>life</u> from the abyss, crowns you with faithful love and tenderness;

⁹ his indignation does not last for ever, nor his resentment remain for all time; ¹⁰ he does not treat us as our sins deserve, nor repay us as befits our offences.

¹¹ As the height of <u>heaven</u> above earth, so strong is his faithful love for those who fear him. ¹² As the distance of east from west, so far from us does he put our faults.

Reading 2, Romans 14:7-9

⁷ For <u>none</u> of us lives for himself and <u>none</u> of us dies for himself; ⁸ while we are alive, we are living for the Lord, and when we die, we die for the Lord: and so, alive or dead, we belong to the Lord. ⁹ It was for this purpose that <u>Christ</u> both died and came to <u>life</u> again: so that he might be <u>Lord</u> of both the dead and the living.

Gospel, Matthew 18:21-35

²¹ Then Peter went up to him and said, 'Lord, how often must I forgive my brother if he wrongs me? As often as seven times?' ²² Jesus answered, 'Not seven, I tell you, but seventy-seven times. ²³ 'And so the kingdom of <u>Heaven</u> may be compared to a king who decided to settle his accounts with his servants. ²⁴ When the reckoning began, they brought him a man who owed ten thousand talents; ²⁵ he had no means of paying, so his master gave orders that he should be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, to meet the debt. ²⁶ At this, the servant threw himself down at his master's feet, with the words, "Be patient with me and I will pay the whole sum." ²⁷ And the servant's master felt so sorry for him that he let him go and cancelled the debt. ²⁸ Now as this servant went out, he happened to meet a fellow-servant who owed him one hundred denarii; and he seized him by the throat and began to throttle him, saying, "Pay what you owe me." ²⁹ His fellowservant fell at his feet and appealed to him, saying, "Be patient with me and I <u>will</u> pay you." ³⁰ But the other would not agree; on the contrary, he had him thrown into prison till he should pay the debt. ³¹ His fellow-servants were deeply distressed when they saw what had happened, and they went to their master and reported the whole affair to him. ³² Then the master sent for the man and said to him, "You wicked servant, I cancelled all that <u>debt</u> of yours when you appealed to me. ³³ Were you not bound, then, to have pity on your fellowservant just as I had pity on you?" ³⁴ And in his anger the master handed him over to the torturers till he should pay all

his debt. ³⁵ And that is how my heavenly Father <u>will</u> deal with you unless you each forgive your brother from your heart.'
